Last October we had the opportunity to provide many of you and your classrooms with some fun resources for learning about the environment, in conjunction with National Forest Products Week which is the third full week in October. With distance learning in full swing within Lane County, we recognize this is not going to be an option for this year. However, we wanted to let you know of some alternative ways you could still incorporate forestry education into your curriculum for National Forest Products Week.
